ANNUAL QUILT SHOW August 10th — 16th

The annual Quilt Show is being held from August 10th through to August 16th at St. David's Historic Church at the entrance to Cape Breton Island, Port Hastings. The quilt show and sale will be open from 10 am to 4 pm each day.

The event draws hundreds of visitors every year from across Canada, the US, and countries from around the globe including Switzerland, the Netherlands, and Germany. Many visitors return on an annual basis to view the displays or purchase quilts. Since the show's inception, we have displayed over 1,000 quilts in this beautiful church and have seen an increase in numbers of both visitors and local quilters who have submitted their works.

Hosted by St. David's Church, the quilt show and sale is one of the largest in Cape Breton and will feature over 100 quilts displayed on the pews in the church or hanging from the rafters. "Celebrating Quilting at the Causeway" has become one of our major fund-raisers. The church receives the proceeds from the donation jar at the entrance which goes towards the upkeep of the 1 year-old church. In addition, the quilters very generously give St. David's a percentage of the sale from each quilt sold. This event is a huge benefit to the church financially.

In addition to providing visitors with an amazing visual display and sale, the show offers quilters from Cape Breton Island and the area the opportunity to promote their craft, their quality workmanship, and gives them an excellent venue to sell their items. Traditional and modern quilts, from baby size to king size, will be available in the church, while smaller items such as wall hangings, table runners, and placemats, will be for sale in the church hall. Strait area quilters will be demonstrating the art of quilting on a quilt that will be set up on a traditional wooden frame. Visitors will be able to watch the quilters, ask questions, and learn the skill of quilting by taking a few stitches of their own. The finished quilt will be used as an additional fundraiser for the church.



The 51st annual Festival of the Strait will be held June 30th - July 10th. June 30th will be launched with a parade of sails at the waterfront in Port Hawkesbury at dusk, and a family bonfire at the waterfront. People are invited to bring their own lawn chairs and musical instruments if they wish to join in a community sing along. Marshmallows and roasting sticks will be provided. A pub will follow at the Strait of Canso Yacht Club at the waterfront with live music starring Jeremy White.



July 1st the Town of Port Hawkesbury will be hosting a free Canada Day celebration at the Granville Green from 11 am-2 pm with cake and music and children's fun activities. Later that evening from 6-8 pm at the Oaklee Bagley Baseball Field (Grants Pond) will be the 2nd annual family baseball tournament in Oaklee's honor with a trophy awarded to the winners. Canada Day evening will be rocking out at the waterfront with Andre Pettipas and the Giants from 9 pm to 1 am for a youth concert by the sea for grades 9-12 (\$5 admission).

July 3rd will be a free seniors summer luncheon at the Port Hawkesbury Civic Centre (need to register by June 27th to attend) with entertainment and a Cape Breton cold plate with dessert, tea/coffee from 12-3 pm. At dusk attend a free old-fashioned drive-in movie at the SAERC parking lot (movie to be determined).

Other events to watch for are a Cape Breton ceilidh on the evening of Tuesday, July 5th at the Port Hawkesbury Civic Centre. There will be a princess pageant on Wednesday, July 6th at the Civic Centre, with spotlight fun in the community park afterwards. Friday, July 8th will be a "5-card dash" — horse track and BBQ fun at the Venture Downs Raceway on Crandall Road from 6-8 pm.

Saturday, July 9th will be jam-packed with a family fun day at the community park (MacQuarrie Extension Drive) from 11 am to 2 pm with games, splash-pad (take towels and swim suits), treats, inflatables, horse rides and fun! Dance the night away 10 pm-2 am at our pub by the sea at the Port Hawkesbury waterfront featuring live band Three Finger Shot with local singer Tony Ronalds (formerly Kilt). Government IDs will be requested. Admission is \$10 at the door.

Sunday, July 10th, enjoy a street parade (anyone welcome to come join in the line up at 11 am) which begins at 12 pm. A concert by land and sea will begin at 1 pm at the waterfront featuring local bands, and a boardwalk market by the sea with many local vendors and BBQ/drinks for purchase at the Strait of Canso Yacht Club. The Granville Green Concert Series begins at 7 pm and fireworks begin at 10 pm to finish off this fantastic festival.

Port Hawkesbury Veterans Memorial Park a place to reflect, relax

For a touch of solemn solitude, and an opportunity to simply sit and relax, visit the Port Hawkesbury Veterans Memorial Park. While there are benches upon which to rest, the atmosphere is one where a person feels the weight of great sacrifice and the fullness of one's own gratitude.

Unveiled in 2013, the Veterans Memorial Park is the culmination of a community's dream of honouring its war heroes, living and dead.

The memorial itself is a stunning tribute to the courage of so many Canadians, particularly those who served from the town and surrounding counties. Its centrepiece is a large bronze Canadian maple leaf which enfolds several Armed Forces figures wearing the various uniforms from the wars in which Canada took part. A number of life-size statues represent soldiers, sailors, Air Force personnel and merchant marines. A military nurse holding a helmet from the First World War kneels by a grave in memory of the Unknown Soldier. It was created by Timothy B. Schmalz, a sculptor widely known for his memorial pieces.

The unveiling of this memorial was a moving experience for those in attendance, with none more moved than those veterans who were able to attend and take part in the ceremony.

If you decide to visit Veterans Memorial Park, to sit among the iconic images and more than 2000 names inscribed there, it will tell you something about the people among whom you are currently visiting, and may well remind you of those from your own home or homeland who have been equally selfless in their sacrifices.



In the Fr. John Angus Rankin Cultural Centre, located on Highway 105 in Glendale, there is much to interest the historian and the general visitor.

In the archive room, one can browse through articles, photos, maps, and genealogical histories of Glendale and area. Anyone searching their ties to the Glendale area can be assisted by one of our members, or inquires can be made by contacting culturalcentre@yahoo.com.

The Glendale C@P site is also located in the Father John Angus Rankin Cultural Centre, giving visitors an opportunity to connect with friends and family during their travels. The C@P site offers workshops and cyber camps throughout the summer, as well as tutoring. You may also make contact for one-on-one assistance sessions on technology questions or help on program usage. Printing, photocopying and scanning are other formats offered.

In addition to technical access, traditional crafts workshops are held at the centre, particularly weaving, with looms available for those tempted to try their hand at this ancient skill.

Photos, artifacts, and history displays can be seen throughout the building, and a gift shop offers locally made crafts, hats, booklets, CDs, Wally Ellison photos, and Cape Breton books. Second-hand books are for sale at reasonable prices.

Kitchen Ceilidhs

Starting June 1st through September, the Father John Angus Rankin Cultural Centre in Glendale will be hosting kitchen ceilidhs every second Wednesday at 7 pm (June 1st, 14th, 28th; July 11th, 25th; Aug. 8th, 22nd; Sept. 5th and 19th). The musicians will vary with each kitchen ceilidh. Admission is by donation, and includes a light lunch to follow.

While today's dances are of a kinder, gentler nature, the people of Judique enjoy evoking the past by naming their annual festival and its associated dances with that proud motto, Judique on the Floor.



Judique's Celtic Cemetery Trail Hike

The Celtic Cemetery Trail hike is a testament to the pioneers that settled the area.

Located next to the Celtic Music Interpretive Centre is a beautiful hiking trail where you begin in present day and hike to the pioneer past.

The natural beauty of the trail system paired with the stillness and peacefulness of the cemetery is an experience that everyone should take in.

Celtic culture is thriving in this region. This exceptional trail system meanders along the coast and provides first-class trail experiences for bikers, hikers, runners, quadders, skiers, snowmobilers and horse-back riders.

The hiking trail is perfect for the young and old, for the two-legged as well as the four-legged.

Follow this trail though the cemeteries, new and very old, through wooded areas and down

to the beach where oftentimes you'll discover a

bagpiper playing with the salty wind at his back. The hike takes you near the location of the original church which stood, so it is told, close to the ocean's shore, most likely near to where the pioneer graveyard was unearthed. In the early 1900s the church had burned to the ground.

In 1924 the cornerstone of the new stone church was laid. St. Andrew's Catholic Church, the large stone structured church, is the oldest Catholic parish developed by Highland Scots on Cape Breton Island.

The stones were moved by horse and sled, the beautiful stained glass was donated by parishioner and the Alter of marble came all the way from Italy.

Each October the Celtic Music Interpretive Centre welcomes students from all over the world to the Buddy MacMaster Fiddle Camp, a week-long camp offered at the Celtic Music Interpretive Centre during the week of the Celtic Colours International Festival. The camp allows students the chance to study with two Cape Breton fiddlers each day, for a total of ten different instructors over five days, each instructor having their own unique style of Cape Breton fiddle playing.

Classes are aimed at intermediate and advanced players who wish to further their skills and learn the Cape Breton style of playing from some of Cape Breton's most respected fiddlers. During the lunch break each day, students will enjoy a ceilidh featuring the two instructors from that day as well as guest musicians. A jam session, open to all musicians and skill levels, also takes place each day after classes, allowing students to play together along with other musicians who frequently drop in at the sessions







Port Hood was first settled by United Empire Loyalists in the 1780s

The Scottish migration of the early 1800s brought more settlers, and by 1818 there were 170 people living in the village, one-half of whom were Scottish, the rest Irish or Loyalist.



The community experienced a boom period from 1880 to 1910 as coal mining, fishing and marine trade flourished. An explosion in 1908 closed one of the mines, and the other was flooded and closed in 1911. A devastating fire in July of 1942 wiped out much of the town's business district.

Port Hood (pop. 710) is the fourth-largest community and county seat of Inverness County. The village has stores, restaurants, accommodations, post office, bank, liquor store, service stations and public wharf. There's a beach in town with a picnic area and supervised swimming. Today Port Hood is a service centre for the surrounding farming and fishing communities and is a popular stop for visitors touring the Ceilidh Trail.

A cairn in the village honours native son Sidney Earle Smith (1897-1959) who distinguished himself in the fields of law, education and politics and who was one-time Minister of External Affairs for Canada.

Port Hood Harbour

Site of historic confrontation over US, British flags

Port Hood, shire town of Inverness County, is located along the shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and that ocean atmosphere permeates the small village. Throughout the summer the sandy shorelines, with five stunning beaches, one of which offers lifeguard services through July and August, give residents and visitors alike a refreshing swim.

But Port Hood's beaches are just the beginning of a memorable discovery of this historic village where, during the mid-1800s, hundreds of ships plied their trade in and out of the harbour. Historian John L. MacDougall in his 1921 *History of Inverness County* tells readers that "fifty-five years ago, this writer remembers counting two hundred sail of the fine American and Maritime fishing fleet, riding restfully at anchor in the harbour at Port Hood..."

It may be of interest to American visitors to learn that during this period so many American ships were trading at Port Hood that one merchant violated the protocol regarding national flags, running the Stars and Stripes above that of the then governing nation's flag, the British Union Jack. The British Navy needed to send a warship in to enforce the proper protocol. That once-vibrant harbour vanished with the erosion of a neck of land that linked the mainland village to what is now Port Hood Island, just offshore.

While shipping may have declined, the fisheries thrived, and today, at Murphy's Pond, during lobster season a fleet of local boats lands catches daily. During the summer months, crab fishermen land their quotas daily on Murphy's Wharf, and later in the season when the tuna are running, tuna fleets bring in many of the large fish, most destined for the Japanese market.





Sunset Sands RV Park

The community-owned Sunset Sands RV Park is located across from the Al MacInnis Sports Centre, the heart of summer activities in the village, and next door to a beautiful beach, just a comfortable chair away from a beautiful sunset, and a swimming pool for parents wanting to keep a closer eye on their children. The RV park has 72 full-service sites with 50 and 30 amps of power, satellite TV hookup, and free wi-fi access. It also offers 12 tenting sites, and is open May 20th to October 10th with seasonal and monthly rates. Rental RVs are available. From mid-June to mid-September, guests have complimentary use of a pool complex across the road (Wharf Road), which has adult and children's saltwater pools.

Port Hood Day Park offers rest, recreation





An Drochaid Bridge Across Time



The local museum, *An Drochaid* or Bridge Museum, operated by the Mabou Gaelic and Historical Society, is an active centre, and "bridge" is an aptly chosen name, bridging as it does the past and the present, presenting the vibrancy of the former through narrations and talents of the latter. A visitor to the museum will see a locally made quilt, the work of several women, called "Memories of Mabou" because it depicts the industries of the area in past years and in the present. One should also see the pieces of woven material from the Glendyer Woolen Mills, which were established in 1848 a few miles outside the village.



Tuesday Night Ceilidh

A weekly summer ceilidh is held each Tuesday evening in the Mabou Community Hall on the village's main street, giving residents and visitors an opportunity to hear some excellent musicians perform. With fiddler Karen Beaton, accompanied by pianist and ceilidh co-host Joey Beaton, the evening also showcases one or more of Inverness County's finest fiddlers. Joey's knowledge of the history of the music is a source of memorable information.

MABOU HOME TO CHIMNEY SWIFTS

In addition to being a place of worship, St. Mary's Parish Church in Mabou is home each spring and summer to chimney swifts

The Mabou roost is one of only 10 sites known for the swifts in Nova Scotia according to Allison Manthorne of Bird Studies Canada in Sackville, New Brunswick. Mabou is the only site in Nova Scotia known east of Pictou County.

There are only 10 known sites in New Brunswick as well and none reported in Prince Edward Island. Manthorne says there were likely hundreds of chimney swift roosts in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick just decades ago.

The chimney swifts usually arrive in Nova Scotia in late May and are usually gone by the end of August when they return to winter in South America.

Bird Studies Canada is "the leading national charitable

organization dedicated to bird science and conservation in Canada. With assistance from the Municipality of the County of Inverness and Environment Canada's EcoAction Community Funding Program, Bird Studies Canada is leading a two-year project to promote chimney swifts as a tourism asset in Mabou."

According to Manthorne, "bird watching is one of the fastest-growing hobbies in North America. The 2012 Canadian Nature Survey found that more than two thirds (70 per cent) of Canadian

adults chose to spend time outdoors in order to experience nature, and almost half (47 per cent) of Canadian adults travelled to experience more nature."

If you find yourself in Mabou near dusk during the summer you might try to catch a glimpse of the chimney swifts as they gather to enter the steeple of the St. Mary's Church.



COME EXPERIENCE MABOU'S KINSHIP PLACE PLAYGROUND

The community of Mabou came together in recent years for a work party and built Kinship Place, a beautiful modern playground on the grounds next to The Mabou Arena/Athletic Centre. The playground was built and named in loving memory of a young mother from the community, Tracey MacDonell-MacDougall (1975-2010).

"The faith, hope and love that Tracey personified in her alltoo-brief time with us helped spark a contagious community spirit that has made Kinship Place a reality," says the plaque memorial dedicated to Tracey at Kinship Place.

The playground is a very popular destination in summer when the Mabou Farmers Market is held inside the Mabou Arena.

The little church was originally built as a memorial to the pioneers of the area and was moved to the man-made hill where it rests today.


The site was dedicated by the Bishop as a shrine to the Mother of Sorrows and to the pioneers who settled the area.

Trails: Exploring in and around Mabou

- Celtic Shores Coastal Trail -

Mabou Rivers Trail Section

"The trail opens up and meanders alongside the South West Mabou River for several kilometres. This section of the trail is pretty in all seasons, suitable for walking, biking, cross country skiing, and snowmobiling. Some of the meadows adjacent to the trail here were once valuable farmland for numerous homesteads founded on the upland side of the trail. West Mabou Beach Provincial Park

Located on Colindale Road, West Mabou, is a natural environment park with public access to a beautiful sandy beach and dune system at the mouth of Mabou Harbour. The park also consists of old farm fields and marshes, with several walking and hiking trails and a picnic


MacFarlane Woods Nature Reserve

Overshot Patterns exhibit at School of Crafts


The main objective of the Scotsville School of Crafts is to perpetuate the traditional Celtic handcrafts while incorporating the most modern methods and techniques.

If you were looking for a living Visitor's Information Centre for the Whycocomagh area you would look no further than retired school principal Burton MacIntyre.

Often called Mr. Whycocomagh, there are few organizations he hasn't belonged to, and if there is something to do or a great place to be then Burton knows all about it.

It was Burton who was the father of the Whycocomagh Summer Festival, the person who kept it running and vibrant for decades until he trained the younger generation to follow his well-worn footprints.

When you ask him how he is, he always answers, "Excellent." Burton points out that the community of Whycocomagh is a hub for the rest of Cape Breton.

It has four restaurants which can seat a total of 150 people at a time; it has motels, markets, businesses, a wharf, a beautiful waterfront centre, a school and two churches.

It has everything you need as a traveler, but as Burton points out you can drive an hour and a half to any major Cape Breton attractions and set Whycocomagh as your base.

Surrounding Whycocomagh are hiking trails that take you into its mountains and this trail, part of the Trans Canada Trail slated for completion in 2017, also includes the Blue Wave which is the water-trail which was every bit as important as the land trails to our pioneers.

"In the summer, there is always something happening, Burton said. "Our inland sea (Bras d'Or) must be part of the Musical Coastline."

The Race for the Cape run may make Whycocomagh part of its tour in 2018.

The "hidden gem" of Whycocomagh is its park which runs up in the mountain and across the road down to the lake.

It is one of the most beautiful campgrounds anywhere, open, clean and surrounded by the beauties of nature.

Summer in Whycocomagh is topped off by the Whycocomagh

Summer Festival, a week of family fun activities that has music, July 11th to 17th culture and fun for everyone who loves to enjoy spending time with a welcoming people and visitors looking for a peaceful way of life.

If you want to kick up your heels there is a fiddle and a dance close by. The season in which we welcome visitors culminates

in Whycocomagh during Celtic Colors in October where there are cultural workshops and one of the best Celtic concerts you'll ever attend.

Whether it is the mountains, the lake or Keltic Quay, Whycocomagh has something unique to offer our summer and fall visitors.

If you hang around long enough you can enjoy Christmas in the Village, another festival not to be missed.

Burton has more step-dancing miles on him than any other Cape Bretoner, so when he says there is fun in Whycocomagh (Head of the Waters in Mi'kmaq) you can take that to the community's bank. **Excellent!**

ORANGEDALE

THE ORANGEDALE STATION

The Orangedale Station is the only remaining one of the Intercolonial Railway Stations on its original building sites built on Cape Breton Island and has been meticulously restored and preserved in mint condition.

This station served a very large rural area and in the early years people came from miles around in their horse-drawn wagons or sleighs, or by foot to catch the train. In its heyday (1930s to 1950s), this station was served by six passenger trains (three in each direction) and up to twenty freight trains daily. This station was also a busy shipping point for lumber, oysters, pit props, Christmas trees and other local products. Incoming carloads included flour, feed, gasoline, western horses, automobiles, machinery, and various shipments of merchandise for the local stores.

Hours of operation are 10 am - 6 pm daily from Canada Day to Labour Day.

A TOUR OF INVERNESS WITH MAYOR HECTOR THE DOG

Hello and welcome!

My name is Hector and I'm the Mayor of Inverness. This is not a well-known fact, mind you, because after all, I'm a dog. But this is my town and there's no one better qualified to show you the sights.

So, if you have your walking shoes on (there's nowhere you can't walk to if you want to give your car a rest), then let's get going!

I'm going to take you

up Forest Street first to the harness racing track.

Long before we had golf courses, Inverness Raceway had been the main attraction in Inverness. The first races were held in 1926, and 90 years later it's still going strong every Wednesday night under the lights and on Sunday afternoons.

Feel free to visit the barns where you'll meet friendly horsemen with interesting nicknames like Snag, Trapper, Hen, Duke, and others. They're always good for a



treat, though I enjoy chasing the barn cats myself.

While we're up here, you should know that behind the barns and stretching the length of the town are a series of trails and old roads that once connected a number of bootleg coal mines. It's a great place to let your dog run off leash, and while it's difficult to get lost, you might want to have someone from the area go with you just to prevent you from walking in circles.

Okay, if we cut through the front of the grandstand and make our way over to Maple Street, we can work our way down past the new Inverary Manor and Inverness Consolidated Memorial Hospital to Central Avenue. A short left past Freeman's Pharmacy and you will see

some signs pointing down to the water along a boardwalk.

Keeping down the boardwalk, you'll see some of the fairways and greens of Cabot Links...but I'd stay on the boardwalk if I were you...



they don't like seeing me on the course unless someone's going to scoop for me.

We're heading to the wharf now, where you can buy freshly-caught lobsters from the men and women who catch them throughout May



and June. And if you're here for Gathering Week during the third week of July, you can get on a boat for a free ride during the Fishermen's Picnic boat parade!

Before we go, we have to check out the beach. I might be a little biased, but this is the best beach in the world. Let's dip our paws in the water before we continue our tour. The water's so warm, and I suggest coming back in the evening just as the sun is setting. My human loves watching the setting sun while floating on his back.

I don't know about you but I'm getting a little hungry, so let's head back up along the boardwalk over to Lower Railway Street.

That's the Miner's Museum on the left where the old railway station used to be. They won't let me in, but I'd come back later if I were you and check out all the great artifacts and displays outlining the history of Inverness.

Following the Miner's Museum, you come upon the new Mill Road Enterprises which is formally the Cottage Workshop bakery. It always smells sooo good there, so feel free to buy me an oatcake or cinnamon roll.

Food, food, food...did somebody say food?

You have three year-round restaurants to choose from: the Coal Miners Café, the



Inverness Village Grill, and the Cabot Public House. Anne and Lil are really good for leaving me a treat out in the back, but you might want to order from the menu. The Downstreet Café is always a great place to gather for lunch and a variety of teas and coffee.

Once summer is in full swing, some seasonal eateries can be found. And if it's fine dining you're looking for, then both Cabot and Glenora Distillery are highly recommended. Mind you, every restaurant usually has a seafood chowder on its menu, so you might want to visit them all to find your favourite!

I'm sorry to say, but it's nap time for me. Making my daily rounds are hard on the old dogs.

So feel free to take in all that my town has to offer: golf a round in the morning; pack a picnic for the beach in the afternoon; check out our restaurants for dinner; then catch a tune at the park on your way to the race track or a local watering hole.

Besides offering a challenging golf course, there is an aspect of Cabot Links that visitors may not be aware of. Inverness is located in Central Inverness County, and for visitors to the Cabot Links there are many other attractions of which they, or any other visitor, should be aware. All along the western coast of Cape Breton Island there are offerings and experiences enough to encourage people to stay an extra or several days just to take it all in.

In JUDIQUE (45 minutes south of Inverness), there is the *Celtic Music Interpretive Centre*, offering food and daily entertainment, music archives and instruction.

In PORT HOOD (25 minutes south), the *Chestico Museum* is a hub of local history; and the village itself is lined with wonderful beaches, one of which is lifeguard patrolled.

In MABOU (15 minutes south), there is the heralded *West Mabou Beach*; the year-round Saturday

night Family Square Dances; the music offerings of nationally acclaimed Red Shoe; several dining options; the nearby Thursday night summer family square dances in Glencoe; and beautiful drives.

At LAKE AINSLIE (15 minutes), there is the MacDonald House Museum; and the Scotsville School of Crafts with on-site demonstrations in weaving.

At INVERNESS, there is a lifeguarded beach, weekly Sunday Afternoon and Wednesday Night Harness Racing, hiking trails, the Inverness County Centre for the Arts with exhibits of resident and visiting artists all summer.

At MARGAREE (30 minutes north),

one of the world's famous Salmon Fishing Rivers is located, including the Salmon Museum with its history of the famous sport.

At CHETICAMP (45 minutes north) and the surrounding Acadian region exists one of the most vibrant



All of these attractions are available within a forty-five minute drive of Cabot Links and Inverness.









Gliding on the surface of a calm ocean at sunset is an experience that should top everyone's bucket list.

Eagle Eye Outfitters offers customized tours, wilderness camping, sport fishing, mountain bike rentals, boat and whale tours, kayak and rental tours. Conrad MacNeil is the captain of Seas the Breeze, which accommodates twelve people, with great seating and also a picnic table/umbrella set.

Cruising along in a fishing boat with style, it only takes Seas the Breeze about 30 to 40 minutes to get to Margaree Island – or Sea Wolf Island, depending on who you talk to. When asked, MacNeil has said that "I really have no boundaries and I will take people anywhere they want to go, and if you don't know where to go I'll show you. There are tours for everyone, for all types of people, young and old, those who have plenty of experience on the water and those who have no experience." He explains that "different tour types include an early morning deep-sea fishing tour from 6 am to 9 am. We also offer two tours happening daily at 11 am and another at 2 pm, both tours lasting roughly 2.5 hours. The daily tours can be directed towards families, and children of all ages are welcome and safe."

For those who are so inclined, Eagle Eye Outfitters knows how enjoyable it is to have a nice cold beverage while breathing in all that fresh salt air, so there is a liquor license aboard Seas the Breeze. MacNeil says the plan is to have the evening sunset tours directed more towards adults. "This is the perfect place to share a cold one with friends. You can fish or swim, kayak or just relax; it's all about whatever you want to do." It certainly is

a fine setting for summer festivities: stag/doe parties, birthdays, weddings, anniversaries or just because.


Anyone who has spent time out on the water knows that a person develops a certain kind of hunger, and being far from land can make a person downright ravenous. When asked about provisions MacNeil said everything about Eagle Eye is about convenience and quality. Food can be provided, "and we will provide quality food. If you want lobsters, we

can provide those, for those who want to fish, we are fully loaded and equipped with everything needed. Fresh, quality seafood and shellfish can easily be catered to those who wish to wine and dine on the deck."

Camping enthusiasts can request or pick a spot to camp and get dropped off by Seas the Breeze and take a kayak and venture off and explore the island. Staying and camping is obviously optional with a ride and pick up at the preferred time. "Or, if you just always wanted to explore Margaree Island or the shores of Cape Breton and never could, I can take you or a group out with the kayaks, to the island or wherever you want to go." Camping, hiking, biking and fishing gear is all available.

If a person is in a more laid-back state of mind there is beauty







A new exhibit was unveiled at the Margaree Fish Hatchery Visitor Centre that showcases the celebrations of plamu (salmon) and its relationship with the Mi'kmaq people.

The exhibit, featuring artwork by Dozay and unique handcrafted plamu by Mary Julia Francis, promotes Mi'kmaq culture through an engaging, comprehensive, and educational display on the cultural significance of the Atlantic salmon to the Mi'kmaq people.

The Margaree Fish Hatchery was established in 1902. They raise Atlantic salmon and brook trout to stock the Margaree Watershed and are instrumental in maintaining the health of the Margaree River, the first river in the Maritimes to be designated a Canadian Heritage River.

This region of Cape Breton was known to the Mi'kmaq as the Land of the Everlasting Fog.

In good weather the Mi'kmaq camped along the Gulf and at river mouths moving inland when the weather became colder.

Fishing was not only a part of their culture but an

important means of survival.

The old fishing techniques are still used to this day.

The Mi'kmaq have treaty rights to salmon and it is still enjoyed at netukulimk (gathering) for community nutrition, but with the decline in salmon it is used responsibly.

Three hatcheries operate in Nova Scotia

with Margaree stocking the Margaree River as well as Mabou, Baddeck and Middle River in Cape Breton.





The Elizabeth LeFort Gallery

Elizabeth LeFort learned to hook rugs at a very young age, mastering landscapes and photographic reproductions, and has been hailed as "an artist in wool."

Elizabeth was so skillful at reproducing photographs that she began to create portraits in wool. Her portrait of American president Dwight Eisenhower was presented to him at the White House in 1957. This was followed with a series of portraits



including Queen Elizabeth II, Pope Pius XII, Pope John XXIII, Jacqueline Kennedy, President Lyndon Johnson, Prime Ministers Lester Pearson and John Diefenbaker, and Prince Charles. Consequently, her art has graced Buckingham

Palace, the White House and Vatican City in Rome.

Always striving for more challenges, she completed a series of reproductions of religious paintings, including daVinci's The Last Supper, and scenes from the life of Jesus.

Two large original works depicting important events in the history of Canada and the United States leave no doubt as to her sense of design and her mastery of the craft.

Elizabeth LeFort, Chéticamp's most famous artist in wool, was awarded an honorary doctorate by Université de Moncton in 1975 and was made a member of the Order of Canada in 1987.

Marguerite Gallant (1890-1983) was a native of Chéticamp with a profound love of collecting. She worked in Pennsylvania for many years as a maid for the Edward Cahill family. It is said that she learned the value of collecting from Mr. Cahill who was an ardent collector.


When she returned to Chéticamp in 1938, Marguerite moved



into a tiny house which she filled with objects of all kinds. As Marguerite's reputation for collecting spread through the community, people brought objects to her rather than let them be thrown away.

After Marguerite's death, La Société Saint-Pierre became custodians of the collection and moved it to Les Trois Pignons. Thanks to this incurable collector, many valuable artifacts from Chéticamp's history have been preserved.



The Père Charles Aucoin Genealogy Centre



When Father Charles Aucoin (1911-1999) retired in 1973, the beneficiary of that retirement was Chéticamp. For the next quarter of a century, the Chéticamp native threw himself into a labour of love, undertaking the laborious task of transcribing by hand all the old church records from 200 years of Acadian settlement in northern Inverness County. Father Aucoin prepared more than 100,000 personal file cards. He also wrote a number of articles on Acadian life and history.

The results of his work are of particular help to former Chéticamp people and their descendants who return to the village in search of information about their ancestors and family history. A very important department at Les Trois Pignons is that of the history and genealogy of the

Chéticantins. Under the able direction of volunteers Jean-Doris (à Joe à Joe) LeBlanc and Charles D. (à Freddie à Damien) Roach, there is accumulated here all possible documentation on these subjects: books, copies of parish registers, census lists, listing of names from all the headstones in the cemetery and old photographs.



Camping at the Cape Breton Highlands National Park

Summertime brings folks fair weather: fair weather gets people outside and makes them truly appreciate the beauty of the natural world.

Whether you are from the area or visiting, camping is one of the best ways to truly experience and appreciate Cape Breton Highlands National Park on the Cabot Trail! Camping forever remains a fun and favoured family tradition.

The Cape Breton Highlands National Park (CBHNP) aims to attract more people to the park and to make their stay as easy and enjoyable as possible. Camping is one of the best ways to celebrate the summer and to spend time with family and friends.

The CBHNP offers camping from mid-May to mid-October. They have five front country, one backcountry and one group campground to choose from.

The Chéticamp Campground, located inside the CBHNP will offer five reservable equipped campsites brought to you by Parks Canada and Mountain Equipment Co-op (MEC). MEC, known for their high quality outdoor and camping gear, have donated the camping gear to make this pilot project possible for Park Canada. Fees for the service will vary depending on the location and equipment provided.

The equipped camping means that there will be a tent set up for campers; tent pads will be provided and basic tenting equipment, including a lantern, an outdoor cook stove, and pretty much everything needed to prepare food outdoors.

The Chéticamp Campground is located in the Rigouèche Valley, approximately 8 km north of the village of Chéticamp, with the mountains on one side and the river on the other. There are wheelchair-accessible sites and washrooms. Firewood is available for purchase, but campfires are only permitted in the designated fireplaces.

Within walking distance, there is the outdoor theatre featuring evening nature programs and concerts, the Visitor Centre with exhibits, slide show and nature bookstore as well as hiking

Visitors who camp for seven or more consecutive nights also receive a 15% discount.

New in 2016: Cape Breton Highlands National Park now offers 20 oTENTiks between the Chéticamp, Ingonish Beach and Broad Cove campgrounds. Part tent, part cabin, the oTENTik allows you to enjoy all the excitement of camping outdoors, while providing a soft bed and a cozy roof over your head.

Chéticamp Campground and Ingonish Beach Campground also offer five reservable equipped campsites each.

pa Rinpoche. It is the first stupa built in Nova Scotia. Ven. Thrangu Rinpoche, Abbot of Gampo Abbey, requested in 1996 that the stupa be built. The project had the strong support of Sakyong Mipham Rinpoche and fulfills the Vidyadhara's request that his relics be distributed between RMSC, Karme Choling and Gampo Abbey. Thrangu Rinpoche consecrated the completed stupa in 2001.

According to Rinpoche, a stupa


traditionally represents the mind of the Buddha and has the power to convey the mind transmission to those who gaze at it. The *stupa*, he said, is dedicated to world peace, and will become


a tourist attraction that will bring many people to the spiritual path. To symbolize the overcoming of aggression, Rinpoche buried weapons in the ground below where the *stupa* was built, including a World War I rifle donated by a Cape Breton neighbour of the Abbey, and he consecrated the site.

MEAT COVE - A Wonderful Camping Experience



Meat Cove is the most northern tip of Cape Breton Island. Its campsite offers beauty, hiking, and the thrill of unpredictable weather patterns. An inspiring place to watch a sunrise.

The village is known for the spectacular views it provides for visitors from across the world, and also for The Meat Cove Campground and Ocean Side Chowder Hut.

The Meat Cove Campground opened in 1986 and is hosted by the MacLellan family. The campground provides people with spacious room for their tents, thirty unserviced campsites, newly built camp cabins, running water, hot showers, beautiful hiking trails mainly all with ocean view.

Kayaks can be rented to paddle along the coast. Or you can just sit at your picnic table and watch the whales glide past!

Cook on an open fire or visit at the Ocean Side Chowder Hut. Here you will find some main dishes such as homemade seafood chowder, fresh halibut, salmon or lobster and crab. Complement these dishes with a Nova Scotian beer or a local red or white wine.

HIKING

Meat Cove is widely known for all its wonderful hiking trails. It offers a variety of trails that will not disappoint you, all with amazing views that you will not forget. Be sure to bring your camera to capture the scenes on film.

CAPE ST. LAWRENCE TRAIL

Trail length 5 km one way, maximum elevation 850 ft. This Trail starts by the office at the Meat Cove Community Centre/Restaurant (check with the office if you plan to leave your vehicle near here) on the gravel road and changes to a narrow track after 150 meters and proceeds up the hill. This is by far the steepest and most challenging part of the hike. In the first kilometer you will climb nearly 700 feet and pass by a wooden gate and the sign for the Meat Cove Look Off trail to your left. By the time you reach a meadow and corral to your right most of the climbing is finished. About 2 kilometers from the start you will see the side trail to Cape St. Lawrence to your right. As of July, 2009 this was well marked with flagging tape on both sides. It's the first trail to your right past the meadows of any size and suitable for an ATV or horse and cart originally. The rest of the hike is an easy 3 km proceeding gradually downhill except for one short steep section. Be sure to check the look-off at the top of this section just past Big Pond.

LOWLANDS COVE TRAIL

Is 5 km to the coast from the Cape St. Lawrence turn-off or 7 km from the Meat Cove Community Centre/Restaurant. Instead of taking the Cape St. Lawrence turn-off at the 2 km mark, keep straight on. After another kilometer you will see the Pollets Cove turn-off to your left; after about another kilometer you should see the disused road and trail to the abandoned zinc mine (1.5 km); another 0.75 km takes you to an abandoned farm. All that remains is a clearing and some farm implements. The trail proceeds gradually down to the coast. The topographic map indicates a side trail to Lowlands Cove Brook starting 0.7 km from the coast. I was day-dreaming and totally missed this turn-off. Judging by the stunning scenery it would be worth locating.

LOWLANDS COVE COASTAL TRAIL

Is 3.2 km coastal trail. Just keep a safe distance from the cliff edge and follow ATV and animal tracks along the coast. If proceeding from Lowlands Cove, the Cape St. Lawrence Light and start of the trail to Meat Cove is easy to find. Proceeding the other way to Lowland Cove, be on the look-out for the trail just before the grassy area changes to a wooden area as Lowlands Brook is approached. Steel posts painted red can be found thoughout the Lowlands. There are a couple located close to where the trail starts inland.

MEAT COVE MOUNTAIN TRAIL

Is 1.3 km to eastern end of ridge. This trail starts a short distance up the road from the Internet Café and is marked by a sign on a tree and a few stones placed to form steps. The trail climbs steeply nearly 900 feet in the first 0.75 km and then levels off somewhat. The grassy ridge of the mountain extends over a kilometer with fantastic views in all directions.

RIVER BOARD WALK TRAIL

This pleasant boardwalk trail extends nearly a kilometer from the Internet Café to the beach.
